I am the man in the street and the genius in his ivory tower, I am Charley Brown and Funkie Winkerbean. I made the first bloody footprints in the snow at Valley Forge, and I took the giant leap for mankind on the moon. I still tingle all over when I hear the Star spangled Banner, and my eyes get misty when I see Old Glory flying proudly in a parade. I would rather work all day on any farm in the United States Of America than spend even one summer on the French Riviera. Why should I support the National Box Car Association?

This will be my first article for this year. And the question is. Why? should I support the National Box Car Association? I, will now tell you of a program who benefitted from The National Box Car Association, as well as VA Hospital and VA Clinic visiting Veterans.

In this article, which, I will call the continuing education of the National Box Car Association. I will zero in on one particular program who solely relies on the Box Car Association for funding. A contest within the VAVS program titled "Keep the Wheelchairs Rolling". This contest is funded solely by the National Box Car Association. This contest was derived and established to create competition amongst VAVS Representatives and Deputy Representatives, and a direction to compete for monies from Nationale donated for VA Healthcare and State Homes. Example, The Ohio Veterans Homes in Sandusky and Georgetown, along with the various VA Hospitals throughout each state.



These facilities put together a "Needs List". The purpose of creating these lists was to off-set monetary short-falls of a Facility and to give the various Veterans Service Organizations a way of donating funds to better the overall experience of the Veteran at any given Facility. Items included but not limited to, would be something as little as coffee to wheelchairs, along with other of items of comfort.

To obtain these items the Representative or Deputy Representative of either the State Home or VA Facility simply review the afore mentioned "Needs List" for their specific facility and chose items of need. What they would then do is submit in writing a description of how the item or items would benefit the Veterans of their Facility. Also required in their communication would be the cost of those items and the total amount needed. Once the letters are completed, they are either e-mailed or regular mailed to the VAVS National Directeur. The National Directeur will then keep them on file until March 31st of that year. After which all requests are reviewed and winners then selected. Checks would then be sent to the winners by Nationale, and those checks then presented to the winning facilities on the behalf of Nationale.

Another item of information is the VAVS Program also maintains an "Emergency Fund". The purpose of this fund is to provide assistance to Veterans being served during that year. The monies used here are over and above the contest monies.

As you can see the National Box Car Association is an important program, and why your support is not only appreciated but, needed for the betterment of all of Nationales Programs.

I know anyone receiving anything from the VA cherishes anything associated with the VAVS. If you need a reminder just ask National VAVS Directeur Ron Rolfes Jr. and he will enlighten you.

This year, VAVS received for Keep the Wheelchairs Rolling from National Box Car \$ 3,000.00 Just for this particular part of the VAVS Program.

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Vice Presidential History

Garret Augustus Hobart (June 3, 1844 – November 21, 1899) was an American politician who served as the 24th vice president of the United States, from 1897 until his death. He was the sixth American vice president to die in office. Prior to serving as vice president, Hobart was an influential New Jersey politician and political operative.

Hobart was born in Long Branch, New Jersey, on the Jersey Shore, and grew up in nearby Marlboro. After attending Rutgers College, Hobart read law with prominent Paterson attorney Socrates Tuttle. Hobart both studied with Tuttle and married his daughter, Jennie. Although he rarely set foot in a courtroom, Hobart became wealthy as a corporate lawyer.

Hobart served in local governmental positions, and then successfully ran for office as a Republican, serving in both the New Jersey General Assembly, ending his time there by becoming Speaker, and the New Jersey Senate, where he



became its president. Hobart was a longtime party official, and New Jersey delegates went to the 1896 Republican National Convention determined to nominate him for vice president. Hobart's political views were similar to those of McKinley, who was the presumptive Republican presidential candidate. With New Jersey a key state in the upcoming election, McKinley and his close adviser, future senator Mark Hanna, decided to have the convention select Hobart. The vice-presidential candidate emulated his running mate with a front porch campaign, though spending much time at the campaign's New York City office. McKinley and Hobart were elected.

As vice president, Hobart proved a popular figure in Washington and was a close adviser to McKinley. Hobart's tact and good humor were valuable to the President, as in mid-1899 when Secretary of War Russell Alger failed to understand that McKinley wanted him to leave office. Hobart invited Alger to his New Jersey summer home and broke the news to the secretary, who submitted his resignation to McKinley on his return to Washington, Hobart died on November 21, 1899 of heart disease at age 55; his place on the Republican ticket in 1900 was taken by New York Governor Theodore Roosevelt.
